OMAN



In 2010 I spent a day hiking black sandy volcanic beaches across the Norwegian island of Jan Mayen in the North Atlantic as part of an expedition voyage from Scotland to Spitsbergen. The goal: an abandoned Dutch whaler's station. Just this year I roamed around the far north of **Norway** visiting my dog sledging partners and spending a day with the reindeer herding Sami leaving with an invite to go back and join their migration. Now that would be something.



SVALBARD

I loved the frontier town atmosphere of the capital Longyearbyen, and the eerie silence of the empty trapper's lodges scattered among the islands. Seeing a polar bear pop its head over a snowy hillock from the deck of the ship and watch it slide down the hill and into the icy water to roll about and play in the seaweed was pure magic. I hope next for me is **Isfjord Radio** - 100 km from civilization, a former radio station - now a boutique wilderness hotel. Stunning nature, Arctic dining, and wildlife experiences - with comfort on the edge of the world. Top it off with a walrus hike and a thrilling RIB boat safari across the fjord.



LAOS

A bit of an epic as I covered **Vietnam** and Cambodia on the same trip. Waking early to give alms to the monks in Luang Prabang is a rewarding experience and in Vietnam's Halong Bay I had one of the best guides I've had anywhere in the world. The extraordinary, tangled profusion of giant strangler roots engulfing the 13th Century temples at Ta Prohm in Cambodia's Angkor complex are a sight to behold.

ECUADOR AND THE GALAPAGOS

At Sacha Lodge in the Amazon - it could take half an hour swung right above your head. Here was where I first heard the eerie sound of a howler monkey. In the **Galapagos**, it was hard to know where to walk on the beaches for fear of treading on a lazy or basking lizard their lack of fear of humans was heartwarming.



BOLIVIA

I'll never forget the huge barren landscapes, weird desert rock formations and undisputedly rugged 4WD journey south to the Salar de Uyuni. My bags were lost on the flight out and I spent 10 days in the same clothes - actually loving the freedom of not having to pack and unpack each day! Parts of **Bolivia** feel as if they are 50 years behind the rest of the world. Definitely a place for those who like dramatic scenery and few people.



MALDIVES

Having visited a number of islands by speedboat (including one that took only a minute to walk across) - I finally settled on Makunudu as my favourite bare -foot experience. Floating on the surface watching turtles feeding right under me and seeing the majestic flap of three manta rays gliding in perfect formation were a huge highlight.



INDIA

My ties with India go back many years - my first solo trip there was in my twenties when I travelled from the far north - Kashmir and Ladakh to the far south - Kerala and Tamil Nadu and from east to west. Little did I know then I would visit almost annually with my husband who was born in Kolkata to visit his family who still live there today. Only last year we took our sons for their first tiger sighting in the wild at the stunning Jamtara Wilderness Camp in Madhya Pradesh - I really rate that place! For pastures new ask about Shakti. Unique onfoot journeys in style and comfort in the Indian Himalayas, Ladakh and Sikkim.



JORDAN

It's the incredible citadel of **Petra** which many think of as they fly into **Amman** but it was the friendliness and warmth of the Jordanian people which enchanted me most. They have endured so much over the years with events just over their borders. The incredibly complete Roman amphitheatre of **Jerash** was quite something!

MONGOLIA

What memories! Arriving into Mongolia by train from China – and seeing my first horseman galloping alongside the track. The vastness of the overland journey by jeep to the Gobi Desert. Stopping to visit nomads in their gers to discuss the best place to cross the river. Following the children as they raced with ponies across the steppe during the Naadam – a golden horde of tiny tots. Riding the nomad's route from summer to winter pastures and staying with the Kazakh eagle hunters. We met a camel caravan at the top of a pass – both extraordinary and timeless





GREENLAND

Less than 5 hours' flight from here is such a hugely different world. I visited **Greenland**'s east coast in early spring – it took several attempts and a lot of ingenuity to get there. Flights having to turn back, helicopters cancelled due to poor visibility and an unscheduled 1.5 hour snowmobile journey in -29C all in the pursuit of a dog sledge trip out of **Scoresby Sund**. On arrival a huge storm blew in taking off our guest house door – we woke to find a 6ft snow drift in the corridor. All rather epic but a thrilling trip. Iceland on the way home seemed quite tame in comparison!

EGYPT

I have always loved the legend and history surrounding early archaeologists in **Egypt** and with great partners there, I always love to plan trips for clients. With the advent of the small boutique dahabeya - it is really opening up ways to explore the Nile at a slower pace and in the company of few. For those with more time - what about exploring little visited and captivating **Siwa Oasis**?



UZBEKISTAN

After three visits, I feel quite at home and have made trusted friends - important as **Central Asia** is not an easy place to plan trips. On my first visit, I trekked with a school party in the south of the country. Flowing rivers, deep gorges, pretty stone walled villages and simple houses set among apricot and walnut orchards left a lasting impression. On subsequent visits the great silk road cities of **Samarkand** and **Bukhara** spoke for themselves.



BHUTAN

I had planned to traverse the country by road, along the one navigable winding corkscrew route. It did not all go quite according to plan - travelling in the monsoon has its drawbacks! A landslide left me stranded on the wrong side of the route out, and I had to walk with my bag for 10kms through the jungle in the pitch black and pouring rain with only fireflies in the verges to light the way, in order to catch the plane home! It took me two days to dry out after that but what an adventure! On my second visit a few years later, the trek seemed quite easy!

ANTARCTICA

I'll not forget my first **Drake Passage** crossing - it was epic - Force 8 winds with seas washing the decks and incredible views from the bridge. Don't let that put you off. Our ships and crews have seen it all and I always feel in very safe and capable hands. Seeing the first penguin on land - four days after leaving home was a special moment as was being in a zodiac among feeding humpbacks - small ships are the way to go. Go soon.





GEORGIA

Thinking back over the 2400kms I travelled around Georgia - there are a few standout moments - hiking in the medieval towered village of **Ushguli** at 2,400m in the **Caucasus**, watching a profusion of hummingbird hawk moths feeding on flowering shrubs at Bodbe Monastery in Kakheti, a close up look at the stunning murals at 12th Century UNESCO Gelati Monastery, eating salty cheese and yoghurt with fresh bread straight out of the oven at the roadside. The cool, edgy bars and restaurants of Tbilisi also deserve mention, as does the wine!



The experience of crossing the immense **Tibetan plateau** with awesome views of the world's most famous mountains is something I will always remember, not least because I was on crutches at the time after a sporting injury! Thank goodness I was in a trusty 4WD. Lhasa with its monasteries filled with flickering butter lamps and prostrating pilgrims has a special place

JAPAN

It's fitting that in the 80th

anniversary year of **Hiroshima**, I reflect on my own visit there. The **Peace Park** and **Museum** was one of the most profoundly moving places I have had the privilege of exploring.

Other special memories - an atmospheric hike through a pine forest littered with shrines to overnight in temple lodging

I just loved **Andalucia** for its magical boutique hotels, delicious tapas, superbly pretty mountain villages just ripe for exploration, carpets of flowers in the hills making great picnic spots and the stunningly beautiful cities of **Seville** and **Jerez**. Seeing the Andalucian horses practising at the Equestrian School was a real treat. Book that mini break now.



CHILE

Stand out memories - the pilot of our light aircraft banking steeply in a figure of eight over Cape Horn; watching the gauchos streaming over the Patagonian landscape of the Torres Del Paine at Estancia Cerro Guido; the extraordinary moonlike landscape of the Atacama Desert. My next wish - to drive the Carretera Austral - one of the most scenic routes in Patagonia-winding through roaring rivers, ancient forests, and the untouched beauty of Chile's southern wilderness. Explora Hotels offer stunning stays in these stunning locations. Ask for details.

Myanmar, Syria and Russia are three such countries, all of which I visited in a time when we could. Moscow and St Petersburg occupy a special place in my travel memories. Our Russian friends came and stayed with us in **Devon** whenever they could. Many of you have had happy times in **Kamchatka** and I so wish our ship partners could restart operations in Wrangel Island and Franz Josef Land where polar bears roam in their hundreds and we can roam at will. I will never forget standing in that stunning amphitheatre at Palmyra and the hospitality of the stall holders in Aleppo, Syria. The Mergui Archipelago 40 miles off the coast of Myanmar was an untouched gem and I stayed in the only hotel there - miles of white sandy bays, untouched reef life and pristine rainforest. I hope one day these will all be back on our radar but we need a huge regime change first.



COSTA RICA

A trip of firsts for me - first time rafting, first time on a zip wire, first visit to Central America. My top-rate memories - bouncing through rapids, being caught in a sink hole and surviving, huge surfing beaches, seeing sloths lazily moving from tree to tree, night walks and close encounters with spider monkeys and toucans right in camp.



REALM OF THE POLAR BEAR

GAUCHOS, WINERIES AND LAKES OF ARGENTINA... FIONA REPORTS BACK!

Making my fourth visit to Argentina in May proved as enjoyable as the others yet even more diverse. See below for a few of my most memorable experiences and start planning a visit of your own:

Glamorous Buenos Aires made a great stopover for a day or two. Contrast the multicoloured houses and whacky street art of La Boca, with the extraordinary stillness of Recoleta Cemetery where visitors make haste to the Duarte family vault to pay their respects to Argentina's first lady Eva Peron. Evenings offer great options too. I sipped cocktails at the roof terrace Sky Bar with cool nightscape and dined on juicy steak at nearby Faena Tango - a low-lit club where strutting music, sharp suits, trilbies, pencil moustaches, high heels and sequinned evening gowns are the order of the day, or should I say night?









Heading 1.5 hours north was Estancia La Bamba de Areco - an 18th century ranch great for riding, polo or just chilling! It was good to be back in the saddle again - a comfy sheepskin atop a western saddle. I followed the estancia's head gaucho at a fast canter round the polo field before ducking under trees to find a typical asado lunch laid out on the lawns - a long table awash with chilled bottles of white and heaped platters of salads, steak and home-baked bread. It reminded me of the stunning Estancia Los **Potreros** where I stayed at some years back in Cordoba - boutique accommodation, great hiking and riding, superb food and atmosphere. Ask me for details.



The cauldron of hot oil bubbled on the barbeque grill and the freshly made empanadas bobbed about, crisping nicely, while delicious flatbreads imprinted with cherry tomatoes, rosemary, salt and olive oil chargrilled next to fat Argentine steak and roasted aubergine. I'd just finished an incredibly fun cooking lesson under the vines at the stunning boutique Cavas Wine Lodge in Mendoza, west of the capital and the epicentre of the Argentine wine district.



If you like to drink wine, this place is a must. New for me - the chance to blend and bottle my own red - Castillo Brijnath 2025!









I also wine-tasted in the nearby Uco Valley in the shadow of the snowcapped Andes Mountains. Gleaming stainless-steel tanks, aged oak barrels and row upon row of orange and red leaved vines in their glorious autumn plumage. Malbecs and Cabernet Sauvignons rubbed shoulders with fruity new Chardonnays and Sparkling Wines. This is a heavenly experience for the vinophile!

Even the 90-minute flight from **Mendoza** to **Bariloche** was something to remember. I was glued to the window for the entire flight as we followed the snow dusted spine of the **Andes** with the occasional white pointed snow peak rising above the soft folds of brown. The night sky was awash with stars and next morning a brisk wind funnelled down over the lake between steep sided wooded hills which I later explored on horseback before swapping four legs for a paddle and taking to the lake in a kayak. **Bariloche**





is the undisputed **Lake District** of **Argentina** and a fantastic place to hike, bike, fish, ride and sail.
